<u>Approval of the</u> <u>March 2021</u> <u>Minutes</u>	<i>Ms. Denahy moved to approve the minutes from the March 2021 board meeting. Ms. Liebert seconded. Motion carried unanimously (17-0). (See Attachment 1)</i>
<u>Governor Polis</u> <u>Welcomes New</u> Board Members	Ms. Shimko introduced Governor Polis prior to his arrival. Governor Polis welcomed GOCO's seven new board members and outlined shared goals and priorities between the Governor's Office and GOCO.
<u>GOCO Year in</u> <u>Review</u>	Ms. Miller shared a review of GOCO's grant programs and awards throughout FY '21, giving details about each program and number of projects awarded through each program.
<u>BoardSpot</u> Discussion	Ms. Lecy shared a presentation on BoardSpot, a new board management portal that GOCO is implementing.
<u>Finance Update</u>	Mr. Tenneson shared an update on GOCO's finances, including information on Lottery proceeds, expenditures and deauthorizations, FY '21 operating budget vs. actuals, and cash management metrics.
<u>Spending Plan</u> <u>Amendment</u>	Mr. Tenneson proposed a spending plan for FY '22 for grant programs in GOCO's two competitive purposes: local government and open space. The foundation for the FY '22 spending plan is the five-year spending plan, which was updated to reflect that inflation this last year, which impacts GOCO's lottery cap, was greater than anticipated.



Mr. Cockrell moved to approval of Resolution 2021-13 to approve the FY '22 spending plan and amended five-year spending plan as presented; Ms. Martinez seconded. Motion carried unanimously (17-0). (See Attachment 2).

Fiscal Year '22Mr. Tenneson presented the draft FY '22 operating budget for the board's approval, noting anOperating8.48% increase from the previous year largely due to staffing increases. The plan also proposedBudgetmoving \$40,000 from the Generation Wild marketing campaign budget from FY '21 to '22.

Mr. Montepare moved to approval of Resolution 2021-14 to approve the FY '22 operating budget as presented; Ms. Liebert seconded. Motion carried unanimously (16-0). (See Attachment 3).

- InvestmentMr. Tenneson and Mr. Siegel led a discussion on GOCO's investment strategy and options forStrategyinvestments based on the rate of return from funds housed in the state treasury. The board
decided to form an ad-hoc committee to explore this further.
- CommunicationsMs. Dempsey and representatives from Sukle Advertising presented on the fifth phase of the
Generation Wild communications campaign, including creative assets and strategy for the
upcoming summer. They also presented background information on the campaign for new
board members.
- LegislativeMs. Aponte and Mr. Denovellis shared updates from the 2021 Legislative Session, including
conservation and outdoor-related accomplishments that pertain to GOCO.
- GOCO CommitteeMs. Miller and the chairs of GOCO's standing board committees shared information for newIntroductionsboard members on committee structures, the role of each committee (finance, communications, and programs), and information on how to sign up for a committee.

A Resolution Approving an Amendment to the Five-year Spending Plan

This resolution is made in view of the following facts:

- 1. Per Article XXVII(6)(2)(e), the board shall determine what portion of moneys allocated to the trust fund shall remain in an interest-bearing account;
- 2. On March 15, 2018, via Resolution 2018-08, the GOCO board approved policies 2.8 and 2.10 *Spending Plans and Opportunity for Public Comment and Multiyear and Annual Spending Plans;*
- 3. On June 11, 2020, via Resolution 2020-16, the GOCO board approved a five-year spending plan for fiscal years 2021-2025; and
- 4. On May 13, 2021, the GOCO committee of the whole board recommended a spending plan amendment and Fiscal Year (FY) 2022 spending plan to be forwarded to the GOCO board for final action.

Accordingly, the board resolves to:

- 1. Amend the five-year spending plan to account for the actual GOCO lottery cap increase for FY 2022 and minor changes proposed to Generation Wild program allocations as shown on the attached five-year plan; and
- 2. Approve the FY 2022 spending plan as presented on the attachment to this resolution. The FY 2022 spending plan proposes:
 - a. \$9,299,789 be allocated to Local Government purpose grant programs in the amounts shown on the attachment to this resolution; and
 - b. \$12,633,122 be allocated to Open Space purpose grant programs in the amounts shown on the attachment to this resolution.

- 1. Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) requested \$150,000 for the 2021 round of the Director's Innovation Fund at the March 2021 GOCO Board meeting through the FY21-22 Investment Proposal;
- 2. GOCO staff and CPW staff reviewed and evaluated 12 applications requesting a total of\$220,938.38;

Accordingly, the Board RESOLVES:

1. To fund eight projects in total, five of which are recommended at partial funding (denoted on the following list with an asterisk):

 - b. Administer the investments in these projects according to the proposal approved by the GOCO Board and the conditions of the MOA;
 - c. Reimburse Parks and Wildlife for expenditures incurred for the investments approved by the GOCO Board.

4. The executive director is hereby empowered to make minor adjustments and additions in the funding awards, in consultation with the director of Colorado Parks and Wildlife, except that any shift in the use of these funds from capital to operations must be brought to the GOCO Board for approval.

The State Board of the Great Outdoors Colorado Trust Fund Resolution 2021-15 June 9, 2021

A Resolution Concerning a Discretionary Investment in the Generation Wild Grant Program

This Resolution is made in view of the following facts:

- 1. On September 24, 2020, the GOCO Board endorsed the use of its discretionary authority to invest up to \$22.8 million in local government and open space purpose funding over five years to advance GOCO's desired outcomes for the Generation Wild grant program as identified in the 2020 strategic plan. Attachment B includes a summary of the board's endorsement.
- 2. GOCO Board Policy 2.11(E) establishes that, through its discretionary authority, the board may "make other expenditures which it considers necessary and proper to the accomplishments of the purposes of" Article XXVII (GOCO Amendment).
- 3. The outcomes of Generation Wild are most closely reflected in the outdoor recreation funding quadrant of the GOCO Amendment yet the projects are sponsored by entities identified as eligible in the local government and open space funding quadrants. The Discretionary Authority Policy allows the board to categorize Generation Wild grants by the eligible entity in the amendment, in this case local governments and land trusts, and not by the purpose achieved by the grants.
- 4. On March 11, 2021, the Board endorsed the use of discretionary authority to finance the award to Colorado State University Extension as they are a well-established entity and trusted partner of Garfield County and GOCO. The board is being asked to use discretionary authority because the work to be completed furthers acceptable uses of the outdoor recreation purpose identified in the GOCO Amendment, yet CSU Extension is not identified as eligible to receive GOCO funds.
- 5. The board allocated \$5,053,775 for the Generation Wild Grant Program in its FY 22 spending plan effective July 1, 2021.

Accordingly, the board RESOLVES to:

- Exercise its discretionary authority and invest \$5,053,775 to the projects identified in Attachment A "FY '22 Generation Wild Grants Recommended for Funding," allocating \$2,500,000 from the local government purpose and \$2,553,775 from the open space purpose.
- 2. Authorize GOCO to make payment directly to Colorado State University Extension.
- 3. Make grants effective July 1, 2021.
- 4. Authorize the executive director to make minor adjustments in recommended funding

levels if a project cannot proceed as anticipated. In the event significant funding changes are necessary as these projects progress, the executive director will consult with the board for further direction.

Consistent with the board's procedure on overdue grants, staff sent reminder notices to grantees with approaching due dates. Subsequent communications with grantees led staff to make the following recommendations.

Open Space Grants

#19150 Lippincott Ranch Joint Land Acquisition (Jefferson County Open Space & City of Boulder Open Space and Mountain Parks) – \$1,000,000.00

On December 6, 2018, the board awarded \$1,000,000.00 in open space purpose funds to Jefferson County Open Space (JCOS) and the City of Boulder Open Space and Mountain Parks (OSMP) to assist with the joint acquisition of the 442-acre Lippincott Ranch, together referred to as the "Partners". The original project completion date was December 6, 2020, and the Partners received a staff extension through June 30, 2021. The property is part of the federally designated Front Range Mountain Backdrop-Foreground Preservation Area and is considered a high biodiversity area by the Colorado Natural Heritage Program. Habitat on the property includes wetlands, riparian areas, and xeric tallgrass prairie, and it is home to numerous rare and sensitive plant and animal species.

GOCO entered into the Grant Agreement knowing that the Partners would need a board extension due to the unique financing arrangement for the purchase of the property. The Partners are under a lease purchase agreement with the Boulder Municipal Property Authority to finance the purchase over a 20-year period. The Partners have entered into a lease agreement with the Property Authority for the 20-year payment period and currently steward and manage the property. As detailed in the Grant Agreement, in addition to meeting GOCO's due diligence requirements, the Partners must meet GOCO's minimum match requirements before receiving their funding award. GOCO and the Partners are currently working through the necessary due diligence documentation, and the minimum match payment will be made in November 2021. The Partners are therefore requesting a board extension through March 31, 2022 to meet the terms of the Grant Agreement and close out the project.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Approval of extension request with the following conditions:

• Completion of the Lippincott Grant Agreement requirements by March 31, 2022



• If for any reason the partners need additional time to meet GOCO's due diligence requirements, GOCO staff and the Partners would like to reserve the opportunity to seek a second board extension.

#19107 Saguache and San Luis Creeks Conservation Legacy – \$330,000.00

On December 6, 2018, the board awarded \$330,000.00 in open space purpose funds to Colorado Cattlemen's Agricultural Land Trust (CCALT) to assist with the bargain sale purchase of two conservation easements in Saguache County. The grant award includes protection of the 2,241.25-acre Saguache Creek Ranch and conservation of 2,092 acres of the Pheasant Valley Ranch, which will result in the protection of the entire 3,858.2-acre property. Conservation of these two properties will protect significant wildlife habitat in the upper San Luis Valley, as well as 1.4 miles of San Luis Creek and 5.8 miles of Saguache Creek. The ranch open space contributes to the spectacular viewshed across the San Luis Valley from the heavily traveled Highway 285, protecting foreground views leading up to the Sangre de Cristo Mountain peaks. Protecting these ranches builds on a significant GOCO-supported conservation legacy in the region, including a 17-mile conservation corridor buffering the Saguache Creek and connecting 415,000 acres of private ranchland conservation and public lands.

CCALT has made significant progress toward the completion of these two transactions and is currently on a staff extension through June 30, 2021. The Saguache Creek Ranch Conservation Easement closed in January of 2021 and Pheasant Valley Ranch is slated to close this summer. NRCS transactions are renowned for taking a considerable amount of time. Given the possibility for delays associated with NRCS funding, CCALT is requesting a board extension through October 31, 2021. This extension is being done out of an abundance of caution to ensure CCALT has the necessary time to complete the Pheasant Valley Ranch transaction. All the project's due diligence documentation is currently being reviewed by both NRCS and GOCO.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Approval of extension request with the following conditions:

- Completion of the Pheasant Valley Ranch transaction by October 31, 2021
- If for any reason the project encounters unforeseeable delays, GOCO staff and CCALT would like to reserve the opportunity to seek a second board extension.

Stewardship Impact Grants

#19506 Purgatoire Watershed Restoration and Recreation Enhancement Project – \$286,296.00

On June 13, 2019, the board awarded \$286,296.00 in open space purpose funds to the City of Trinidad to focus on community and youth corps led restoration and recreational enhancement of the Purgatoire River, Trinidad Riverwalk and Boulevard Addition, and Fisher's Peak Ranch. The completion date for the project is June 13, 2022. To-date, project partners have completed



three weeks of river restoration work, hosted several well attended socially distanced community stewardship events, and developed two online educational modules for current and future community stewards. That said, COVID-19 and gathering restrictions last year forced the rescheduling of several stewardship events for the 2021 field season. As such, the City of Trinidad is proactively requesting a board extension through March 31, 2023 to complete the project and submit final reporting.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Approval of extension request with the following conditions:

- Complete the project and submit the final report to GOCO by March 31, 2023.
- If the project is not closed by its extension date deadline, funds allocated to it may be automatically deauthorized with no further action by the board being necessary.
